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The Significance of Suffering

(Part 1)

Scripture exhibits a paradoxical relationship to suffering. On the one hand, the Bible says that suffering is worthy of *complaint*. Consider the myriad of laments in the Book of Psalms (cf. Pss. 13; 55; 88). God does not denounce the questions or even the anger that His people voice in their pain and perplexity. On the other hand, the Bible says that suffering is worthy of *celebration*. Consider the following admonition from James: "Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing" (Jas. 1:2-4). James's words resonate with a note struck often in Scripture: There is value in suffering. According to Christian theology and contra secular thinking, suffering is not meaningless. Suffering has significance, and Christians should have a working knowledge of the purposes or benefits of suffering that Scripture underscores. We'll look at two of these purposes below and reserve the other four for subsequent bulletin articles.

Suffering positions us to glorify God. The words *suffering* and *glory* are linked in a surprising number of biblical passages. Paul says repeatedly that our sufferings prepare for us an eternal glory (Rom. 8:17-18; 2 Cor. 4:17). In 1 Peter 1:6-7, the apostle explains why his readers are "grieved by various trials." These have come, he writes, "so that the tested genuineness of your faith—more precious than gold that perishes though it is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the revelation of Jesus Christ." Trusting God in our suffering obviously prepares and refines us for a future glory, but it also glorifies God in the present, which does not go unnoticed by God or others.

When we treat God as God in the midst of our suffering, we not only glorify Him, but we also show the world where our trust and strength reside. It is when we suffer that we are most tempted to forget who God is and to question Him as to why He didn't do things the way we thought He should. While there is a place for perplexity and questions (see above), we must allow our suffering to remind us of God's unwavering trustworthiness (cf. Job 13:15). In our suffering, we are giving an opportunity to glorify God in a special way. Moreover, our patient endurance of suffering, when onlookers know that we are Christians, can point them to God, revealing His greatness, power, and glory, as well as His worthiness to be trusted and obeyed. Paul never forgot the way Stephen bore up under suffering (Acts 7:54-60; Acts 22:20; 26:14), and Paul would become a "Stephen" to others (Phil. 1:12-13; 2 Cor. 4:10). When we demonstrate in our suffering that God matters more to us than anything or anyone, it gets people's attention. It always has; it always will.

Suffering produces dependence on God. Suffering has a way of transforming our attitude toward ourselves. It humbles us and removes pride. It shows us how fragile we are. Most folks in Western society have extremely unrealistic ideas of how much control they have over their lives. Suffering removes the blinders. Suffering strips the self-satisfied of their pride. Suffering does not so much make us helpless and spin us out of control as it shows us that we have *always* been vulnerable and dependent on God. Suffering merely helps us wake up to that fact and live in accordance with it. Such was certainly the case with Paul (2 Cor. 1:8-10; 12:7-10). It is hard to be haughty when you're hurting.

Moreover, suffering can drive us toward God to pray as we never would otherwise. In suffering, we can find greater depths of intimacy with God than we thought possible. John Newton, who composed "Amazing Grace," once wrote the following to a grieving woman: "Above all, keep close to the throne of grace [in prayer]. If we seem to get no good by attempting to draw near him, we may be sure we shall get none by keeping away from him." Humility involves depending on God in prayer (1 Pet. 5:6-7).

Finally, suffering can strengthen our relationship to God as nothing else can. C. S. Lewis's famous dictum is true that in prosperity God whispers to us but in adversity He shouts to us. Suffering is indeed a test of our connection to God. It can certainly tempt us to be so angry at God and at life that we have no desire to pray, but it also has the resources to greatly deepen our dependence on Him.
