In order to remotely access the worship service this Sunday, June 7, at 10:30 a.m., you can go to one of two places: (1) Jacob's Facebook Page or (2) Pulaski Street Church of Christ's YouTube Channel. If you're having trouble viewing the video on Facebook, then switch to the YouTube stream.

These Sunday morning services will be aired at 6 p.m. on Sunday evenings over the radio at least through the duration of this pandemic. (6 p.m. is not an exact time; the broadcast should begin sometime between 6 p.m. and 6:30 p.m.) To listen to the broadcast, tune your radio to 106.1 FM (Lawrenceburg), 93.1 FM (Loretto), or 590 AM (Lawrence County). You will also be able to access the broadcast through the X Radio App on both Apple and Android. Our main target group for this endeavor are those in our church family and other sister congregations who do not have access to the internet, Facebook, etc. Please share this information with anyone you might know who could benefit from it.

Starting on Sunday, June 7, Jacob will be livestreaming a Sunday evening Bible class from his Facebook page and from Pulaski Street Church of Christ's YouTube Channel at 6 p.m.

Prevailing Over Prejudice

Societies all over the world continue to be plagued by prejudice and racism. I would argue that such realities are perennial sins. They are heart problems that persist no matter how much we may detest, protest, or condemn them. As long as we continue to exist in this fallen world, there will always be people that nurture racial prejudices and practice racial discrimination. But for those of us who recognize that such things are incongruous with our commitment to Christ, what can we do to prevail over prejudice or reign over racism?

We must cultivate a heart that genuinely loves everyone. Jesus says, "[L]ove your neighbor as yourself" (Matt. 22:39), and He reveals in the Parable of the Good Samaritan that "your neighbor" even includes those people we would not be inclined to consider our neighbor (Luke 10:35-37). Compassion for all is key. Throughout His ministry, Jesus had compassion on all people, no matter where they came from, how they looked, or what they had done. Even our enemies, Jesus says, should be loved (Matt. 5:43-48), which principally entails wanting and doing what is best for them. Jesus wants us to remove whatever shackles are holding us back from loving others—whoever they may be.

We must approach or treat others as we would want them to approach or treat us. Jesus says, "And as you wish that others would do to you, do so to them" (Luke 6:31; cf. Matt. 7:12). When we fail to treat others, even those who are different from us, as we would like to be treated, then we are breaking the so-called "Golden Rule." No one wants to be alienated or mistreated. No one wants to be slighted or overlooked. No one desires to be prejudged or stereotyped. Since we don't want to receive such treatment, we should not give such treatment.

We must reflect God's impartial nature. Human beings have an undeniable tendency to discriminate against other human beings on the basis of race, age, gender, etc. Interestingly, the early church, including her apostles, battled this tendency. Our God, however, is impartial, and though it was difficult for the apostle Peter to acknowledge this fact, he eventually got it: "Truly I understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him" (Acts 10:34-35). As God's people, we must reflect such impartiality. When we show partiality for any reason, we sin (Jas. 2:9). We must commit ourselves to doing good to all people, not just some people (Gal. 6:10; 1 Thess. 5:15). In fact, Jesus expects us to take the Good News to all people (Matt. 28:18-20). Our target audience is everyone. We are commanded to be indiscriminate in sharing the Gospel.

Shouldn't we be ecstatic that Jesus wasn't prejudiced? Jesus didn't come into this world just to save His people, i.e., the Jews. He came to give His life for all people (1 Tim. 2:4-6; Titus 2:11; 1 John 2:2; 4:14). Jesus, in that sense, is an equal opportunity Savior. Anyone and everyone can respond to Him and realize the salvation that He offers through His blood. Shame on us if we ever allow certain prejudices to overshadow Jesus' unprejudiced gift of salvation.

safety measures:

- Maintain social distancing (e.g., no handshaking or hugging; no sitting next to another family on the same pew).
- Minimize use of nursery and restrooms.
- Refrain from using the water fountains (bottled water will be available).
- Exit your row at the end of the service when your row is called.
- Deposit your contribution in a basket, and throw away your PCK(s) as you leave through the foyer.
