**Jesus' Integrity & Our Hope**

Imagine if Jesus had not been a man of integrity. If that were the case, it would be foolish for us to hang on His every word. All His teachings, warnings, and promises would be empty. He would not be someone worth following, and we would certainly be unable to trust Him. Furthermore, His sacrifice would have been a farce. A man without integrity is a sinful man, and a sinful man does not constitute a sufficient sacrifice for the sins of whole world. We would still be in our sins and without hope in the world.

In order to have hope in something as monumental as heaven, such a hope would need to be backed by a person who honors his commitments, is never duplicitous or misleading or evasive in what he says, follows through on every promise, never fails to carry through on every obligation, passionately observes every law, is never wrong in his opinions, knows when to speak and when to remain silent, carefully avoids unedifying conversations, will always tell people what is most needful for their souls, and will never utter so much as a syllable that might prove destructive or harmful. Jesus Christ is the only one that ever has or ever will fit this description.

Jesus is “the faithful and true Witness” (Rev. 3:14). When Jesus bore witness to the Father, we can be sure He provided an accurate portrait. In fact, as Jesus said on one occasion, “He who has seen Me has seen the Father” (John 14:9). When Jesus testified to the fact that we could be set free from our sins (John 8:31-32), we have no reason to doubt Him. When Jesus promised His faithful followers a home in heaven one day (John 14:1-3), we can stake our lives on that promise. Jesus—God in the flesh (John 1:1, 14; 8:58; Col. 1:15-20; 2:9)—was incapable of lying (Rom. 3:4; Titus 1:2; Heb. 6:18). Thus, our hope is inextricably tied to Jesus’ truthful testimony with respect to various spiritual realities.

Jesus is “the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world” (John 1:29; cf. Rev. 5:12). Of course, if Jesus had been a blemished lamb, His sacrifice would have been ineffective. Fortunately, Jesus was “a lamb unblemished and spotless” (1 Pet. 1:19). Jesus lived in perfect submission to His Father in all things (Matt. 26:39; John 4:34; 5:19, 30; 6:38; 8:28; 12:49; 14:10; Phil. 2:8; Heb. 5:8). He lived in perfect submission to God’s law (John 8:46; Heb. 4:15; 7:26). With these truths in mind, Paul’s words should resonate with us: “He made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf, so that we might become the righteousness of God in him” (2 Cor. 5:21; cf. Rom. 5:19). Not only should we find in these words a reason for the hope that is within us, but we should also find all the motivation we need to remain loyal to the Christ.

On July 21, 1983, 288 construction workers were waiting for the sound of the gun that would mark the beginning of construction on a house in Palmer, Alaska.

They were going to be timed to see how fast they could build a house. They were encouraged by a crowd of 6,000 spectators and a country band. The record they set was incredible. In just 3 hours, 53 minutes, and 59.49 seconds the lucky couple, Rocky and Pat Weldon of Anchorage, stood on the steps of their brand new house. The two-bedroom house cost \$80,000.

To top things off, a furniture company then furnished the house in less than four minutes.

"Instant houses" are possible, but not instant homes. Homes take time to build.

They are not built out of brick and mortar, but out of love, hope, patience, and trust. There will be no band playing, no crowd of spectators to watch, not much fanfare. It takes perseverance and commitment. There is never a time when you can sit down and say, "It's finished." There is always need for consideration, tenderness, and thoughtfulness.

But there is a real joy that comes from the building. Seeing your children grow up into fine Christians is a great thrill. Watching your mate mature and grow is exciting. With love as the foundation and a Christian home as your goal—building can be one of life's greatest pleasures.
