Excuses People Make for Not Going to Church

Part Three

"Going to church" is a popular, modern phrase that we frequently use to refer to the practice of attending worship services on a regular basis at a particular congregation. Admittedly, the phrase can leave people with the impression that "church" is simply an event to attend each Sunday rather than the people of God who are called to live for Him each day. Nevertheless, we should acknowledge that assembling with other Christians for worship—especially on Sundays—is an important aspect of being a Christian (cf. 1 Cor. 11:18, 20, 33). Despite its importance, however, many people, including professing Christians, make excuses for not regularly attending worship services. We've already looked at six excuses; in this article, we'll look at the last three.

"The people aren't very friendly." I've been a visitor elsewhere, and it is frustrating to walk in, worship, and walk out without people speaking to you, much less taking notice of you. But I've come to realize that if I want to make friends wherever I go, I have to be a friend to make a friend (cf. Prov. 18:24, KJV). And let me say, perhaps with a tinge of biasness, that Pulaski Street is a friendly congregation. That's not to say that a family or individual here or there hasn't been overlooked, but a consistent and concerted effort is made by many members every Sunday to make our visitors feel welcome.

"Too many of those folks down there are hypocrites." If this person's definition of a "hypocrite" is anyone whose practice doesn't perfectly match his/her profession, then I guess we would all have to admit to being hypocrites. Why? Because nobody is sinlessly flawless (Rom. 3:23; 1 John 1:8, 10), which would mean that not even those who make this excuse are perfect. The fact is we are all imperfect, and we can be inconsistent, insensitive, and incompetent at times. After all, we are human. The church exists so that we can help each other deal with our shortcomings, uncover our blind spots, and make changes for the better (cf. Eph. 4:11-16). An extremely brief response to this excuse could go something like this: "If, in fact, so many of us are messed up down here, while you're obviously not, then why don't you come down here and help us?" Another extremely brief response to this excuse could be "Your soul is far too precious to allow a few hypocrites to get in the way of your salvation." Yes, any given church is bound to have a few bona fide hypocrites who not only believe they are holier than everyone else but who also refuse to acknowledge their sins and failures (cf. Luke 18:9-14). But it's difficult to imagine a congregation where this is true of the majority.

"I've been feeling discouraged lately." When you're feeling blue, it's hard to want to go anywhere, but when you're feeling discouraged, what better place is there to be than in the presence of God and His people? I know it might not always seem like it, but most folks are struggling with something, e.g., sin, discouragement, apathy, or something else. In worship, they are hoping to hear an encouraging word from the Lord. They are hoping to get medicine for their weary soul. Those who make this excuse might get what they need, and they may even be able to encourage someone else in the process. Hebrews 10:24-25 is as much about assembling to encourage as it is about encouraging us to assemble. Worship services are the absolute best place to go when you're feeling down. They will help you to shift your focus from yourself to God and others.

Imagine making any one of the excuses we've discussed over the last three weeks in the hearing of a Christian who's undergoing severe persecution for his/her faith but still makes every effort to assemble with the saints. Imagine making one of these excuses in the presence of Christ who suffered and died on your behalf.

Closing it out:

Many Christians often place trials and temptations into the same category, but they are two very different things. Thinking about the difference between them could help us to handle each one more appropriately.

Trials are things that are completely beyond our control. They are external factors that we can't change. Trials are things that happen to us. They test our faith. Some examples of trials that come to my mind are sickness, death, natural disasters, fires, and the loss of a job. We have no control over these things, and while the effects of them may not necessarily be devastating, there is no denying that they bring stress into our lives. A good biblical example of someone who had many trials to endure is Job. He lost everything. But God was still faithful!

Temptations, on the other hand, are internal. They are within our control, and they are specific to each one of us. I may not be tempted by the same things that you are and vice versa. According to James 1:14, "each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire." It is a personal, internal struggle. Temptations can come about in response to a trial that we are facing, such as being tempted to lash out in rage about a specific trial that life has thrown at us. The two are completely different things. But God is also faithful in temptation.

In 1 Corinthians 10:13, Paul tells us that we won't be tempted beyond what we are able to bear and that God is faithful amidst the temptations we face. This is true. It is also true that we need to understand that this statement is relative only to temptations. There absolutely will be trials that we face in life that we simply cannot handle on our own. In those phases of life, we need to remember that God is faithful and to lean on Him and His people.
