A Paradox in Proverbs About Words

Words are powerful. The power of words springs mainly from two qualities. The first quality is **permeation**. The old adage "sticks and stones may break my bones, but your words will never hurt me" is a load of hogwash and buzzard puke. Just because it's spouted by first graders doesn't mean it's true. A truer adage goes like this: "Sticks and stones can bruise your body for a few days, but words can scar your soul for life." What is done to you is of little account beside what is done in you, and the latter may be for good or ill. Words affect our feelings about ourselves (Prov. 12:18; 15:4b), our attitudes toward others (Prov. 18:8), and our convictions about God and reality (Prov. 11:9)

Words can hurt. Words can devastate. You can probably recall the pain of someone's harsh words scalding your soul. As devastating as words can be, they can be offset by words of truth, hope, and love. Words can heal. The right words at the right time can be helpful, healing, and life-transforming. You can probably recall the healing or help that came from someone's kind or comforting words to you at a difficult point in your life. Proverbs 18:21 reads, "The tongue has the power of life and death." What you say can give life to you and to other people, or it can take life away. "Upwords" can revive, heal, and change our lives. "Downwords" have the power to bind, imprison, and destroy.

The second quality is *proliferation*. Since words implant ideas in other people's minds, their effects intensify for good or evil. A worthless man's words are likened to a "scorching fire" (Prov. 16:27). A dishonest man spreads strife (Prov. 16:28a). On the other hand, a good man will find his words bearing fruit both in the good that finds its way back to him (Prov. 12:14a) and in the benefits that reach out to many others, as from a "fountain of life" (Prov. 10:11; cf. 18:4) or a "tree of life" (Prov. 15:4).

Words are puny. The weakness of words arises from three considerations. First, words are no substitute for deeds. In Proverbs 14:23, a contrast is drawn between "toil" and "talk": "In all toil there is profit, but mere talk tends only to poverty." It has been said that mankind seems to be divided into three classes: dreamers who have great ideas but never accomplish much, talkers who exercise their jaw muscles and vocal cords but not their hands and feet, and doers who talk little but with God's help turn their dreams into realities. Will Durant said, "Talk is cheap because the supply always exceeds the demand." Indeed, when all is said and done, there's a lot more said than done.

Second, *words cannot alter facts*. The most brazen denials (Prov. 28:24) and strongest excuses (Prov. 24:12) will make no impression on the final Judge.

Third, words cannot compel response. A teacher cannot influence the apathetic or the foolish. "By mere words a servant is not disciplined, for though he understands, he will not respond" (Prov. 29:19). "A rebuke goes deeper into a man of understanding than a hundred blows into a fool" (Prov. 17:10). The other side of the matter is that evil words are subject to the same handicap. The juiciest piece of gossip has no power over the listener unless his character is compromised: "An evildoer listens to wicked lips, and a liar gives ear to a mischievous tongue" (Prov. 17:4).
