Helping an Addict

In his book entitled *Christian Counseling*, Gary Collins writes that "[a]n addiction is any thinking or behavior that is habitual, repetitious, and very difficult or impossible to control regardless of the consequences." With this definition, Collins has in mind both substance abuse and certain behaviors, such as working and gambling, but it's the former that we want to focus on in this article. Most of us, if not all of us, know at least one person who has battled or is battling an addiction.

In my estimation, addiction is both a moral failing and a disease. The initial and early decisions to use certain substances (e.g., depressants, stimulants, opiates, hallucinogens) reflect a person's free and conscious choice for which he or she is culpable. However, once the brain has been changed by addiction, his or her willpower becomes impaired. Perhaps the most defining symptom of addiction is a loss of control of the use of a certain substance. A disease is what happens in the body as a result of those initial choices. Once an addiction has complete control of the person, the craving can far outweigh the decision-making process, and the most unthinkable acts, like robbing a pharmacy or taking the life of another person, can be rationalized.

Helping an addict is a daunting task, and what might work for one person may not work for another. Nevertheless, below are some broad ways in which those of us who are Christians can help (not enable) those who have been overcome by an addiction.

Encourage repentance (2 Cor. 7:10). One of the classic signs of addiction is denial. The adage is true: "The first step to fixing a problem is admitting the problem." We must help substance abusers acknowledge and take responsibility for their addiction. Unfortunately, it often takes a person hitting rock bottom to look up and resolve to take control of his or her life.

Supply resources (Gal. 6:10). Treatment, both residential and non-residential, is available for addicts, and we can help folks find the treatment they need. Of course, such treatment can often be expensive, but where there is a will, there is a way.

Provide accountability (Gal. 6:1-2). While it is theoretically possible for an addict to put the substance down and never pick it up again, it is easier said than done. Recovery demands that addicts accept relapse as a possibility for the rest of their lives. A plan for accountability will help to prevent relapse and will aid the addict if relapse occurs. An "accountability network" of eight to ten people is most helpful. Having this number of people gives the addict options, and it increases the chances that someone will be available to come to the addict's aid. NA, AA, and Celebrate Recovery also have accountability components.

Give forgiveness (Matt. 18:21-35). The principle of unending forgiveness is likely one of the most difficult concepts to apply, especially when dealing with an addict. When the addict has lied, manipulated, stolen, and engaged in a variety of other sins to secure his or her habit, it is difficult for Christians to be willing to forgive. Condemning them, bringing up past events, dwelling on negative behaviors, and shaming them are not proper or helpful solutions. This is not to say that "tough love" is not permissible, but it's helpful to keep in mind that a person who is struggling with full-blown addiction is not thinking straight and is sure to make terrible decisions that they would not otherwise make if they were sober or not abusing some substance.

May God help us as we seek to help those who struggle mightily to help themselves. Aiding addicts can be inconvenient, demanding, and frustrating, but since Jesus helped us when we were helpless (cf. Rom. 5:6), then we should do the same for others.
