Why We Need Translations of the Bible

Christians affirm that the Bible is God's inspired Word (2 Tim. 3:16). The Bible is normative for Christian doctrine and practice. It shows us the way of salvation, and in its life-giving words we meet the Word, Jesus Christ (John 1:1). But the Bible did not drop from the sky in a golden parachute—and certainly not in English. The sixty-six separate books it contains all had to be written by someone. In fact, around forty people from a variety of backgrounds wrote the Bible over a span of 1,500 to 1,600 years. The Bible has one divine author and many human authors (cf. 2 Pet. 1:19-21). The human authors wrote in the languages they knew: Hebrew (with a smattering of Aramaic) in the Old Testament and Greek in the New Testament.

Biblical Hebrew belongs to the Semitic group of languages of which the most widely spoken today is Arabic. Like other Semitic languages, Hebrew is written from right to left. [Weird, huh?] It is comprised of twenty-two consonants, five of which have a different form at the end of a word. Hebrew originally had no written vowels. [Crazy, right?] Most Hebrew vocabulary is built from root words of three consonants. Various prefixes and suffixes are added to these roots to indicate pronouns and prepositions. A Hebrew sentence, especially in poetry, may consist of only two or three words, but eight or nine English words may be necessary in translation. Hebrew only has two tenses: one for completed action and one for incomplete action. Many sentences have no verbs at all; a verb must sometimes be supplied in English for the sentence to make sense. Some recognizable English words are actually Hebrew loan words, such as *sabbath*, *jubilee*, *hallelujah*, and *amen*.

Biblical Greek, like Hebrew, has its own alphabet, consisting of twenty-four letters. Unlike Hebrew, Greek, a European language, is written from left to right and has vowels. [That's more like it.] The Greek of the New Testament is not as elevated or polished as the more literary classical Greek dialects; it is known as *koine* (or common) Greek. The form of a Greek noun, not its placement in a sentence, is what determines its role or function in a sentence. Greek verb tenses do not entirely correspond to English expectations. Many verbs in Mark, for instance, are in the present tense. Translated as such, it would sound like a running commentary: "And now Jesus is healing the blind man, and now he is on his way to Jerusalem. . . ." Additionally, compared to English, Greek uses far more participles, i.e., words ending in -ing, making it difficult to produce a natural rendering. NT Greek shows considerable OT influence and contains a large number of Hebrew-style expressions and grammatical forms (i.e., Hebraisms). It also contains a few untranslated Aramaic words, like *abba*, meaning "father." Within the NT, the quality of Greek varies. The most polished is found in Luke, Acts, and Hebrews with the most torturous in 2 Peter and Jude. The Greek of Revelation is very stylized and full of OT imagery. Paul's Greek (found in Romans—Philemon) is generally elegant, but he sometimes writes in long, complex sentences (Eph. 1:3-14). Translating these can be like unraveling a tangled ball of string! Well-known Greek words include *agape* ("love"), *logos* ("word"), *apostolos* ("apostle"), and *ekklesia* ("church").

Unless a Christian has learned the ancient languages of Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek, he or she is thankful for his or her translation of the Bible. Precisely because Christians believe Scripture is God's Word, they desire access to that Word, so that they can know what God has done for them and what He expects of them. And here's something else to consider. In William Tyndale's day, the common man didn't have access to Scripture, so he had to trust the religious elite who had said access. On one occasion in a debate with an unnamed opponent, Tyndale was told that "it is better to be without God's Law than the Pope's." Tyndale retorted, "I defy the Pope and all his laws. If God spare my life, before many years I will make sure that a boy who drives the plough knows more of the Scriptures than you do." Due to the accessibility of translations today, Christians don't have to take any man's word for God's Word; they can go straight to the Word and hear from God.

Closing it out:

Over the years I have had several people ask me about the little circle-shaped tool that I blow on before beginning a song. It's called a pitch pipe, and as the name indicates, when you blow air through each hole, it produces the pitch that is marked for that hole. As long as you know which note to blow for a song, you can accurately set the pitch for the song you are about to sing. Basically, it helps you get off to the right start.

Getting off to a good start is important. When leading a song, if you pitch it too high or too low, it makes it very difficult or impossible for all parts to sing effectively. It's a good thing to have a good start in many other areas of life as well. We do our best to give our children a good start in life. We try to make preparations prior to work and school so that we can achieve the goals that we have set. A good start is important.

What if we don't capitalize on a good start? We may start a song correctly, but then allow the pitch to raise or drop substantially or slow the song down dramatically, making it difficult to finish. We may have everything in order before a day of work begins, but if we don't follow through, what good did our good start do? We must follow through in order for a good start to do as much good as it can!

By all means, get off to a good start, but make sure nothing hinders you from finishing.
