The Components of Communion

Over the past two weeks, I have discussed both the commencement and continuation of communion. In this final installment, I want to highlight seven components of communion. To say the Lord's Supper is a rich expression of worship might be an understatement.

A sacred tradition. A tradition is something that has been handed down from one person to another, which is, in turn, handed down from that person to another. A tradition can be devised by human beings or determined by God. It can be sacrilegious, sacred, or something in between. In 1 Corinthians 11:23, Paul essentially says that the Lord's Supper is a sacred tradition. The phrases "I received" and "I delivered" show that this tradition was apostolic and came from the Lord, not man. Some traditions should be changed. Other traditions can be changed, if deemed desirable or necessary for one reason or another. Still other traditions should never be changed, and the Lord's Supper is one of them, since its source is none other than Jesus.

A messianic banquet. Jesus promised His disciples when He instituted the Lord's Supper that He would eat and drink it with them in His kingdom (Luke 22:18). Every first day of the week the citizens of His kingdom gather around His table (1 Cor. 10:21) to eat His supper (1 Cor. 11:20). It is not our kingdom, table, or supper. It is His kingdom, table, and supper. He sets the table before us. He invites us to His table. We are His guests. He is the host, and He is the ultimate presider as we gather around the table. As we eat and drink at His table, we do so to honor Him.

A thanksgiving feast. In all three Gospel accounts of Jesus' institution of His supper (Matt. 26:27; Mark 14:23; Luke 22:17, 19) and in Paul's description of the Lord's Supper (1 Cor. 11:23-23), the Greek participle eucharistēsas, translated "had given thanks," is used. For this reason, not a few people have come to refer to the Lord's Supper as the Eucharist. When a church "gives thanks" for the bread and the fruit of the vine, we are thanking God for the salvation provided by the death and resurrection of Jesus.

A covenant meal. In each account of the institution of the Lord's Supper (Matt. 26:28; Mark 14:24; Luke 22:20), including Paul's discussion in 1 Corinthians 11, the text speaks of a "new covenant" or "covenant" in reference to the blood of Jesus. When Jesus shed His blood upon the cross, the Old Covenant was cancelled, and the New Covenant was commenced (cf. Heb. 9:15-28). This language indicates that this meal is reserved for those who are in covenant with Jesus and that they belong to Him and no one else. When Christians eat the bread and drink the cup, they renew their commitment to honoring the covenant they have with their Lord.

The Components of Communion

A family fellowship. In 1 Corinthians 10:16-17, the ESV translates the Greek word koinonia (often translated "fellowship") as "participation." In other translations of this passage, koinonia is translated "sharing" (NASB) or "communion" (KJV). These terms call attention to the mutual sharing, both with Christ and with one another, that characterizes the church, or family of God. Another phrase associated with the Lord's Supper that points to a familial fellowship is "the breaking of bread" (Acts 2:42; cf. 20:7). This term portrays the Lord's Supper as a sharing of food together. In the biblical world, table fellowship was a sign of closeness and acceptance. It said volumes about the relationship that existed between participants. As we break the one loaf (1 Cor. 10:17), we are proclaiming that we are united as one family in Christ.

A memorial supper. When we eat the Lord's Supper, we commemorate and remember a past event: the sacrificial death of Jesus Christ (Luke 22:19; 1 Cor. 11:24-25, 29). As I eat the unleavened bread and drink the fruit of the vine, I must remember that Jesus died for me that day. I must understand that the Son of God had me in mind as His blood streamed from His body and puddled at the foot of the cross. It is also important to recall that Jesus died for the person sitting next to me as well. We all share a common predicament for which Jesus' vicarious death is the only solution. Paul goes on to say in 1 Corinthians 11:26 that participating in this memorial of Jesus "proclaims his death." In the Lord's Supper we visibly proclaim—a proclamation that is as loud as any words—that we believe Jesus died for us.

A hopeful celebration. As we eat the Lord's Supper, we do so "until he comes" (1 Cor. 11:26). This phrase affirms that a glorious future goes with the past event of Jesus' death, burial, and resurrection. When we eat the Lord's Supper, we not only bring the past into the present, but we also proclaim our hope—our confident expectation—in that glorious future. So, in a sense, we also bring the future into the present. Our future sharing with Christ is so certain that we celebrate it now. When we eat the Lord's Supper, our attention is not directed just to a past event, but also to our future hope that is guaranteed by that past event. Perhaps our respective observances of the Lord's Supper could stand to be more cheerful and less solemn.
