In Matthew 7:1, it's not judgment per se that is prohibited; it is the manner and basis of judgment that is condemned. In last week's article, we noted when judgment is, in fact, demanded. Below highlights when judgment is disparaged.

Judgment is disparaged when it is done hypercritically. Have you ever met a hypercritical person, i.e., somebody who won't let you get away with anything and whose criticisms of you are callous and seemingly ceaseless? Many of the Pharisees were hypercritical of others. The measurement they used was nitpicky and unfortunately based on misinterpretations and misapplications of the law, as well as their own concocted traditions (cf. Matt. 5:21-48; 15:1-20). They criticized and judged sinners, and they even criticized and judged Jesus. For anyone who chooses to follow in the Pharisees' footsteps, Jesus' words in Matthew 7:2 are quite sobering: "[W]ith the measure you use it will be measured to you." There's a principle of reciprocity. The least that such hypercritical judges can expect is to be judged with equal harshness by other men. But the passive verb, as often in Matthew, probably conceals God himself as the agent. Just as God will forgive those who forgive (Matt. 6:14-15), He will condemn those who cruelly and ceaselessly condemn others (Jas. 2:13).

Judgment is disparaged when it is done hypocritically. The picture in Matthew 7:3-5 is grotesquely humorous. The picture of somebody struggling with the delicate operation of removing a speck of dirt from a friend's eye, while a vast plank in his own eye entirely obscures his vision, is ludicrous to the extreme. Yet when the caricature is transferred to us and our ridiculous fault-finding, we do not always appreciate the joke. We have a fatal tendency, it seems, to exaggerate the faults of others and minimize the gravity of our own. We often have a rosy view of ourselves and a jaundiced view of others. Being hypercritical almost always joins hands with being hypocritical. After all, hypercritical judges often fail to apply to themselves the criticism that they so meticulously apply to others (cf. Rom. 2:1-3), and Jesus is seeking to correct that here. Jesus is not saying that we should just mind our own business. The fact that being hypercritical and hypocritical are forbidden does not relieve us of familial responsibility towards one another. A bit of dirt in the eye is, after all, rightly called a "foreign" body. It doesn't belong there, and to leave it there would hardly be consistent with brotherly love. Jesus is not condemning correction as such; He's condemning the correction of others when we have not first corrected ourselves.

Judgment is disparaged when it is done hastily (John 4:24a). In John 7:24, Jesus says, "Do not judge by appearances, but judge with right judgment." Here Jesus condemns hasty, superficial judgment. To judge someone strictly on the basis of race, cultural background, unsubstantiated rumor, appearance, financial standing, etc., is as wrong as it gets (cf. Luke 10:25ff.; 15:1ff.; Gal. 2:11-14; Jas. 2:1-13).

Commenting on Matthew 7:1, John Stott states, "The command to judge not is not a requirement to be blind, but rather a plea to be generous." All of us make judgments regarding others. We are forced to do so just about every day. But any judgments we make should be rendered compassionately, humbly, and introspectively, being informed by both the facts and the truth of Scripture. We need to be as critical of ourselves as we often are of others and as generous to others as we always are to ourselves. There are wrong ways to judge, and surely the best of us errs in these ways on occasion. But there are also right ways to judge, and these must not be neglected due to a misconception of what Matthew 7:1 teaches.

#### <u>Closing it out</u>

Acetaminophen (Tylenol) and ibuprofen (Advil) are the two most commonly purchased over-the-counter medications to treat fever and pain, and they work to varying degrees for different people. Depending on what other prescribed medications you may be taking, you may not be able to take either of them. Both of them have potential side effects. The basics of how they function are a little bit different. While both are advertised to help with pain and fever, Advil is also capable of helping alleviate inflammation.

The primary way these medications relieve pain is by blocking pain receptors in the body, which keeps us from realizing that we have a headache or some other pain. While the underlying condition may still be present, we feel relief. However, if we have a broken leg, pain medication may help temporarily, but when it wears off, our leg will still be broken. We will need to see a doctor.

Similarly, we may ask for forgiveness from God and others for things that we have done, which can make us feel better. However, if we haven't actually repented and made the necessary changes, there will still be issues. Once we continue in our ways, the need for forgiveness will arise again. It could be that we have a heart problem. We'll need to see a doctor. Thankfully, the Great Physician is available.
